

Have yourself a merry Cromwell Christmas

A medley of songs from *Oliver!* by Lionel Bart was very popular with the audience. The two exuberant renditions of *Consider Yourself* were exhilarating.

The choir's expressive account of the Beatles' song Yesterday successfully conveyed the feelings of melancholy, longing and nostalgia. Their rendition of Windmills of Your Mind was captivating – a lady behind me whispered 'Marvellous'. Involving a gentleman of the choir as the Duke, Alexandra Picton treated us to The Duchess' Song from Gilbert and Sullivan's The Gondoliers. Her dramatic performance was hilarious. Everyone was laughing – we were having fun.

The choir ended with their special song, As Long As I Have Music, bringing to a close a wonderful afternoon of Winter Delights.
